The Ottauquechee Health Foundation has

reached an important milestone in the vision and mission established many years ago by our founders.

Having successfully established Mount Ascutney Hospital as the primary care service provider in the Ottauquechee Health Center, the time has arrived to move away from real estate ownership.

In April, OHF sold the Health Center building to DEW, a Vermont Construction Company, which is already updating and improving the building's systems for Mt Ascutney Hospital. Mt Ascutney has a long term lease at the Health Center and will remain in our community for years to come.

Our stellar Executive Director, Sherry Thornburg, and her staff can now turn their talents to deeper development of the Foundation's Good Neighbor and Community Organizational Grant programs. More time can be devoted to education and resource development to enhance and improve the health of our communities' residents.

Since 1999, the Ottauquechee Health Foundation has granted more than 2.5 million dollars and we are excited to expand our

grant giving capacity now that Sherry and the Board of Trustees will be less involved in real estate management.

We welcome your questions, comments, advice or desire to volunteer on an Ottau-quechee Health Foundation committee. Thank you for your generous support to the health of our communities - Barnard, Bridgewater, Hartland, Killington, Plymouth, Pomfret, Quechee, Reading, and Woodstock.

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# 2012 ANNUAL REPORT


The Ottauquechee Health Foundation was a year of business as usual with grant making and also a year of developing exciting new partnerships and the implementation of new community health initiatives. With the guidance and expertise of our Finance Committee, our financial status is secure. Overall, OHF is committed to meeting the health care needs of our communities through grants, funding, and support which promotes and improves the health of our communities.

#### **Grants**

The basic work of the Ottauquechee Health Foundation is our grant making. In 2012, we gave a total of \$166, 476 to community support. The three established categories are Good Neighbor Grants, Organizational Grants, and Loan Forgiveness Grants.

Our **Organizational Grants** included an ongoing project developed from within the Foundation.

The Community Care Coordinator (CCC) is a project funded by the Foundation in partnership with Mt. Ascutney Hospital and Health Center and other community partners. This program is in the beginning of year three and continues to grow and meet the needs of our community. The role of the CCC is to help patients follow their treatment plan, review individual and family needs in the home-setting, and to access services and resources within the community. In 2012, the Community Care Coordinator program employed Lonnie Larrow, a Community Nurse, and Katrin Tchana, a Social Worker.



In 2012, the Foundation was able to make grants of \$120,722 to 28 agencies addressing health needs in our communities. A list of the year's **Organizational Grants** is on page 5.


The Good Neighbor Grants program is the heart of the Foundation's work and continued to meet critical needs for those without means to pay their health care costs. We made 52 grants, totaling \$40,977. These payments, made on behalf of those in need, were sent directly to the doctors, dentists, pharmacists, medical equipment suppliers and mental health providers who provided the services. Dental grants made up two thirds of the total funds granted. While the number of dollars granted was less than 2011, the number of individuals assisted increased. By partnering with organizations such as the Red Logan Clinic and Lions Club, we were able to share funding of several requests, and also refer applicants to other organizations who could provide them with the help they required.

In 2012 we supported one local health care provider through our Loan Forgiveness Program, which seeks to

retain health care workers providing care in our service community.

In addition, the OHF makes payments for respite grants to family caregivers. Applications for these grants are available from the Community Care Coordinator Team and are evaluated and approved by them.

Over the past 13 years, the Ottauquechee Health Foundation has granted more than \$2.5 million to improve access to health care in our communities.

The Foundation's annual revenue continues to derive from three main sources: the endowment, comprising investments of past gifts and bequests; the annual appeal and other contributions during the year; and the net income from our two rental properties at 32 Pleasant Street.

#### Expense

Our primary expenses continued to be our grants and the costs of running the Foundation, including grant administration, fundraising, operating programs such as the Good Neighbor Grants and other community health leadership projects. We continued to manage our two properties at 32 Pleasant Street. The spaces within them are rented to both health providers and non-profit providers, with non-profit provider leases offered at below market rates.

#### **Fundraising Goals**



#### Aging in Community

The Foundation collaborated with the Thompson Center to assure that all households in our community knew about the variety of Aging in Community resources, both non-profit and for profit. Postcards were mailed to all households in the nine towns we serve with contact numbers for the Community Care Coordinator program and Thompson Center. addition, resource manuals were compiled for each of the nine towns served by OHF. These manuals were strategically placed in each town.

In partnership with the Norman Williams Public Library, this pilot series of five seminars began in 2012 with an aim to provide education and information in support of making informed health choices by individuals and communities. The first seminar was held in September of 2012 and the last in May of 2013.
